National Fraternal Order of Police Hosts Law Enforcement Labor Summit Chuck Canterbury, President of the National Fraternal Order of Police

Delegates from the labor organizations representing the largest law enforcement agencies in the United States gathered in Las Vegas, Nevada this February in a summit hosted by the National Fraternal Order of Police. ICPRA Chairman Greg O'Connor and The Police Federation of Australia President Vince Kelly were also in attendance.

The first meeting of its kind, the Summit sought to bring the leadership of the FOP together with the leaders of other large law enforcement organizations to discuss the political climate of the United States and the challenges faced by American law enforcement officers in recent years.

These officers have faced layoffs and furloughs, attacks on collective bargaining rights, and large scale reductions of wages, pensions, and benefits. Delegates to the Summit discussed how these issues have impacted their agencies, shared information on what they have and have not been able to accomplish, and sought advice on how best to handle the challenges moving forward.

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Harvard Trade Union Program

Last Friday I finished the Harvard Trade Union Program run through the Labor and Work Life Program, Harvard Law School. The program has reinforced for me how lucky we are in Australia that our labour movement – not just police unions - has secured so many benefits including reasonable recreation, sick leave and long service leave provisions.

We also take for granted our ability to negotiate collective agreements that both improve our wages and conditions of service and protects us as employees from abuse by employers. This capacity simply does not exist for the vast majority of workers in both the private and public sector in the United States.

The South African Police Service (SAPS) estimates that a police officer is killed every ten days in the country. It is for this reason that the country's leading Police Union, POPCRU has launched various campaigns in defence of the lives of police officers.

The men and women in blue are dedicated in their work and are directed by the Constitution of the country which states "the South African Police Service has a responsibility to prevent, combat and investigate crime. 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A Summer of Challenges for Northern Ireland's Police

Without exception EuroCOP members are deploring the specific effect of cutbacks in police budgets on the Schengen Agreement.

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
